
## PARCEL CARD.



Parcel Card accompanying a parcel sent 4 June 1943 from Kielce to Rozwadów, arriving 8 June.



Parcel Card sent 26 June 1943 from Warsaw to Stalowa Wola via Cracow.



Parcel Card sent 14 July 1943 from Warsaw to Jarosław ("Jaroslau"), arriving 18 July 1943.

26 Oct. 1943: Large Registered Cover, sent by registered mail from Krakau 3 to a German Oberstleutnant of Luftzeuggruppe B in Cracow, with 2, 4, and 10 Zl (iss. 10 Apr. 1943), Hitler 32, 40, 48 Gr (24 Oct.1941 iss.), and 50 Gr and 1.00 Zl (7 Apr.1942 iss.), all with "4 years of Nazi Govt." cancellations.

23 May, 1943: 400th Anniversary of the Death of Mikołaj Kopernik (Copernicus).
One stamp, designed by W.Dachauer and engraved by F.Lorber. Printed recess but with with letterpress black overprints "24. MAI 1543". The stamp itself is a reprint of the I + I ZI stamp of 20 Nov. 1942. Medium, white paper. No watermark. Perf. 14. Sheets in 4 panes of 5 x 2 stamps, cut into sheetlets as shown

below.

The Sheetlet:



Sheetlet, Plate No. 1/2, of the Copernicus stamp in claret with black date overprint.

June, 1943: Portrait of Hitler facing Right with Smooth Background. Further three stamps of the issue of 12 such stamps of 26 Oct., 1941. Printed photogravure by the Govt. Printing Works, Vienna, on medium white paper. Gum vertically speckled (sometimes barely visible). No watermark. Perf. 14 x 142. sheets in 4 panes of 10 x 5 stamps each.

Notes: These imperforate stamps appear to originate from excess printing beyond the authorised total, which should have been destroyed as printer's waste but somehow found their way into the trade.

All three are scarce or very scarce. None are thought to have ever been used postally. Compare with similar imperforate stamps of the issue of 26 Oct. 1941; also with the stamps with recessed background of 7 April, 1942 and their re-issue of 1944.

June, 1943: Portrait of Hitler facing Right with Smooth Background, contd. (Perf. 14 x 14½).

On Cover.



Sent 29.11.43 by Registered Express Mail from "Cholm, (District Lublin)" to Nr 30, ulica Mleczna in Radom. "Cholm" = Chełm. Stamps used: 60Gr, 80Gr, and the earlier 24Gr. Arrived Radom 30.11.43.

14 Aug. 1943: 3rd Anniversary of the National Socialist German Labour Party ("Nazi Party") in the Govt.-General Region. Issue with premium. Not a single Pole has ever been found willing to join that infamous organisation. Five stamps designed by W.Kreb and printed photogravure with the central German coat of arms embossed, by the Govt. Printing Works of Vienna. No watermark. Perf. 14. Sheets in 4 panes of 10 x 5 stamps each.



12 + 38 Gr deep green: Cracow Gate in Lublin.



24 + 76 G carminered: Cloth Hall in Cracow.



30 \* 70 Gr purple: Edifice of Provincial Commission in Radom.



50 Gr + 1 Zl deep blue: Bruhl Palace in Warsaw.



1 Z1 + 2 Z1 violetblack: City Hall in Lwow (stylised).

In use until the end of the German occupation.

Another document throwing some light on the barbaric treatment of the conquering Germans on their Polish neighbours.



Signed Międzyrzecz, 24 September, 1943, and postmarked Międzyrzec 25 Sept.43 for return to Biała Podlaska:

Delivery Voucher of a Court Notice from the [German]District Court of Justice[!] of Biała Podlaska [District Lublin, now (1996) Provincial Capital of Biała Podlaska Prov. in easterm Poland], Department of Alien [read: Conquered Poles] Affairs, signed between (Statement of Time Required!) 10 and 11 a.m., 24th September, 1943. personally by the addressee. Voucher printed in German and Polish.

No postage stamp required.

1944: Re-issue of the Three Top Values of Hitler's Portrait Facing Right with Recessed Background of 7th April, 1942 (but now with fine, regular

Perf. 14 x  $14\frac{1}{2}$  comb perforation, isstead of the original rough, irregular line perf. of  $12\frac{1}{2}$ ).

2): The 1 Z1 and the 1.60 Z1 are scarce, but the 1.20 Z1 is rare.

20 April, 1944: Hitler's 55th Birthday. Three stamps designed by W.Kreb, showing Hitler's portrait facing left. Printed photogravure by the Govt. Printing Works, Vienna, on medium, white paper. No watermark. Perf. 14 x 134. Sheets in four decorated panes of 5 x 5 stamps each (see subsequent pages).
